#### The New Normal

We've been open to the public for a month now, and we're slowly expanding our hours and bringing back services we used to provide. Due to state mandates, we still have some limits, and we'll continue to follow CDC guidelines. So far, all of our patrons have been very patient and understanding about the situation, which we appreciate. So, thanks to all of you; you've been terrific!

Our **current hours** are Monday & Wednesday from 9 a.m. - 3 p.m., Tuesday & Thursday from 9 a.m. - 6 p.m., Friday from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m., and Saturday (CURBSIDE PICKUP ONLY) from 9 a.m. - 1 p.m.

If you come into the library, you'll need to follow safety guidelines, like **wearing a mask** or other face covering, using **hand sanitizer** when you first enter and maintaining **social distancing** as much as possible between yourself and others.

If you come in to **browse for books** or use our **copy machine**, we ask that you check out your materials or make your copies without loitering. If you **use our computers**, there's a two-hour limit, and you can sign up for a time slot at our front desk.

If you **pay for prints or fines** with cash, we will accept exact change only, and if you pay with a credit or debit card, there's a \$5.00 minimum. If you buy anything from our book sale, we can only take cash (in exact change).

Due to popular demand, we've decided to continue offering **curbside pickup** as an option and will for the foreseeable future. This is a quick and easy way to get books if you know what you want. You can put books on hold through the My Account page on our website (whitehallpl.org) or over the phone (610-432-4339). When they arrive for you, we'll call you to schedule a day for you to pick them up.

All item **returns** go in the yellow drop boxes in our parking lot. No materials will be accepted at the front desk. After they're returned, we put everything in quarantine for 4 days before we check it in (using the date you returned it as the check in date). You'll see the items listed in your account until then.

If you have items to **donate**, though, please come to our back staff door during business hours. Due to the extremely high volume of incoming donations, we ask that you limit yourself to no more than three bags or boxes at a time. (We prefer them to be in bags or boxes instead of loose for ease of storage.) We take books and most other media in good condition, except for magazines, textbooks, and encyclopedias.

Books and computers aren't the only things that the library offers. We also like to host different **programs and events** throughout the year. For now, those events are going to stay digital, mostly through Zoom. Watch our events calendar

If you look in our library, you can find nonfiction books and DVDs on yoga in the 613.7 section.




#### **Database Spotlight: OverDrive**

This database offers a wide selection of eBooks and eAudiobooks that you can read on various devices. For eMagazines, you can visit our RBDigital Magazines database.

#### Logging In

Start from our homepage (whitehallpl.org), and you can find OverDrive under our Research & Learn menu. Then, when you go to sign in, select your home library from the dropdown



menu. (If you don't know what your home library is, ask one of our front desk workers, and they'll be happy to tell you.) After that, the page will ask for your library card number and PIN. You can find your library card number on the back of your card. (If you have a new LCLC card, the card will be purple, and the number will start with 6000000...) Your PIN is a 4-diit password that you created at some point, usually when you first sign up for your card. If you don't remember setting it up or forgot what it was, one of our desk staff can change it for you.

One thing that can throw people off when using OverDrive is the name. When you get to the OverDrive homepage through our website, you'll see that it says "Carbon Lehigh Downloadable Library" at the top. Don't worry; you're in the right place! Also, when you download the app to use OverDrive, the app is called Libby.

#### **Using It**

There's a search bar in the upper right-hand corner of your screen. There, you can search for authors, titles, or subjects, just like you would in our catalog. If a book is available to borrow, you can borrow it. Otherwise, you can place a hold and wait for it to come in. When you borrow a book, it's "returned" automatically, and you'll no longer be able to read it after the due date. This means that you never get any late fees on these books.

#### **Blind Date With a Bag of Books**



#### Book Nook: "Get a Library Card" Month

Seems like there's a month for almost everything. Although our library is still following CDC restrictions, we are glad for each step that takes us closer to "normal". If you're an avid reader and library user, you may have purchased books online during quarantine, and were surprised to discover how expensive they are. The average retail cost for an adult hardcover book is \$28, and a child's picture book is \$18. Granted, places like Amazon give discounts, but if the book is a clunker, you still lost money.

Maybe you discovered **electronic books** through our website (whitehallpl.org). The LCLC (Lehigh Carbon Library Cooperative) has 13 libraries that select and purchase downloadable print and audio books. These can be downloaded to your e-reader, PC, or your phone using the Libby app (see pg. 2). LCLC also provides electronic magazines. Our library also subscribes to several expensive databases, like Ancestry and Reference



Sometimes people wonder why they need to provide **proof of residence** to get a library card. That's because not all municipalities support public libraries. A local example is Northwestern School District, and those residents must purchase annual library memberships. If you live in Whitehall or another area that supports public libraries, though, part of your taxes already go to your home library.

You are allowed to borrow items **free**, and we trust you to return them, but if you don't, we need to contact you with reminders. Library theft is a Pennsylvania Statutes, Title 18, criminal offense. More importantly, if you don't return library materials, you are stealing from YOUR community. But we find 99% of OUR library users are trustworthy. So, dig out that library card, borrow some books, DVDs, and music CDs, and explore some of the really interesting databases we offer, too. If you don't have a PURPLE LCLC card yet, we can help.

#### **Color the Dragon**




#### Logic Puzzle: The Quest
