Kids' Creepy Fun

- Movie Night: The Nightmare Before Christmas: Wed., October 25, 6 p.m.:

Database Spotlight: More Halloween

If you want more Halloween, several of our databases can help you do the job. You can hunt around depending on your area of interest, but we have a few choices if you want Halloween **eBooks**. You can get them from **OverDrive** (for all), **TumbleBook Library** (kids), **Teen BookCloud** (teens) and **hoopla** (which also has movies and music, but is only available for adult Whitehall residents). You can access these and most of our other databases from home by going to our Research & Learn page and logging in with your library card number and PIN.



Museum Spotlight: The Mütter Museum

Did you know that the library offers **museum passes** to check out for free? Passes are checked out for one week with no renewals and can only be checked out at the Whitehall Township Public Library and returned inside this library at the circulation desk. You may place a hold on a pass. Overdue fines are \$10.00 a day.

October's museum pass spotlight is for the **Mütter Museum!** This museum displays its beautifully-preserved collections of anatomical specimens, models, and medical instruments in a 19th-century "cabinet museum". The museum helps the public understand the mysteries and beauty of the human body and to appreciate the history of diagnosis and treatment of disease. The pass allows for four guests.



Book Nook: Ghost Stories

Ghost, specter, phantasm, spirit, spook, apparition, phantom, shade, wraith... call them what you will, they make a good story. If they're evil, they become ghouls, poltergeists, and demons. When a ghost is fixed to a particular place, the story expands to a haunting. October is the perfect excuse to add a ghost story to your reading.

The first written record about a ghost is on a clay tablet from Babylon, dated around 1500 BCE. It is a guide to exorcise them. Many cultures feature ghosts, real and imagined. They can be found in myths and legends, which is in our nonfiction collection under the Dewey number 398. If you want books about real ghosts and haunted places, look in the adult and juvenile nonfiction sections beginning 133.1. Charles Adams, a local author, has published several books dedicated to our area. One of my relatives was interviewed by him, and her first-hand encounter with a real ghost is included in one of Adams' Berks

County books.

If you want fiction, there are so many books. Dickens's A Christmas Carol is a ghost story. Don't forget Poe, Henry James, H. P. Lovecraft, or Shirley Jackson, to name a few. Our library has popular cozy mysteries with ghosts like the Bailey Ruth series by Carolyn Hart and the Aunt Dimity series by Nancy Atherton. For the younger set, we have The Ghost Patrol series by Andres Miedoso in the juvenile paperback section. You can explore our library catalog using the subject ghosts for hundreds more books to keep you in the Halloween mood.
